Why and How the P2P Program Started

- Long interest in improving copyright education for librarians
- Harvard's First Responder program got my attention
 - But our program is different to meet our needs
- Received internal grant
 - Funded project must make a difference throughout the libraries on campus
- Open to many types and levels of staff

Goals

- For library staff to increase their copyright knowledge and awareness and learn how these issues pertain to everyday work
- To build staff members' confidence in answering and referring questions about copyright
- To foster an atmosphere where everyone can feel free to ask questions about copyright

Staff Members' Needs & Wants

- To complete the program so that peers and supervisors would recognize their expertise
- Love of learning and personal interest
- Many deal with copyright issues at work
 - Reference, special collections, acquisitions, technical services, preservation, and more

What We Promise

- Copyright information that staff can use right now
- Involve all levels of staff, EPA and SPA, in all units as appropriate.
- Participation will count as work time
- Engaging and not too onerous (while still delivering important content)
- Start each session with a short lesson, but spend most time on group discussion of case studies and real-life dilemmas
- Will meet 1.5 hours once a month (initial classes)
- Readings are optional
- Use the power of storytelling, through case summaries and case studies, to help staff learn and remember

Structure of Classes

- Currently about 35 people who work for the UNC Libraries have participated
- Have run the classes in a variety of configurations
 - Six months (1 class a month)
 - Spread over three days (1 per week)
 - Spread over two days
- Open to running classes for evening, night, or weekend workers.

Make it quirky & memorable

Reasons for participating


- Past help from Anne resolving copyright questions
