COLLABORATIVE FEDERAL DEPOSITORY LIBRARY PROGRAM [CFDP] UPDATE – June 2017

Highlights -

- 37 of ASERL's 38 members are FDLP libraries; 12 Regional Depositories in 10 states.
- Currently, 40 libraries have signed MOUs to serve as Centers of Excellence (COE) as part of this program; 29 are Selective Depositories, and 8 COE libraries are located in the Southeast but are not members of ASERL.
- COE libraries have adopted six Cabinet-level agencies and 219 SuDoc classifications for collection building. 14 agencies have been adopted by a second COE. ASERL Disposition Database:

The University of Florida developed and hosts the ASERL Disposition Database to facilitate the disposition of federal documents within the Southeast as a means of supporting the Guidelines for Managing FDLP Collections in the Southeast Region.

There are 11 service areas represented 309 depository libraries in the Disposition Database: Alabama, Florida (← includes Puerto Rico and Virgin Islands), Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia, and Maryland (← includes District of Columbia and Delaware).

From July-April of FY2017 - 229,014 documents have been posted to the ASERL Disposition Database for "adoption" by other FDLP libraries, of which 11,088 documents were claimed. Of those claimed, 2601 documents were claimed for use in Center of Excellence collections; the others were claimed for non-COE parts of local FDLP collections. Since the database was launched in 2012, more than 66,450 documents posted for disposal have been claimed by another library and added to their collections.
