Combined Alternative Textbook

- Funded for July 2016 - June 2018 by North Carolina LSTA
- \$38,000 to buy textbooks over two years
 - \$8,000 matching textbook purchases
- \$56,000 to provide mini-grants over two years
 - \$8,000 in mini-grant matches



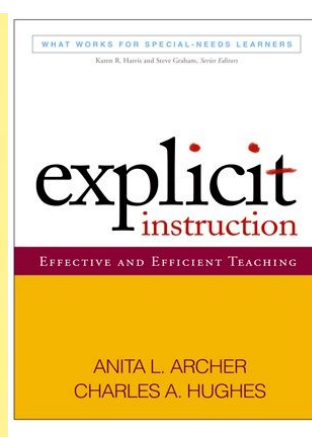
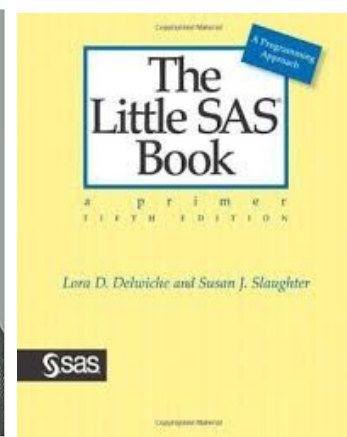
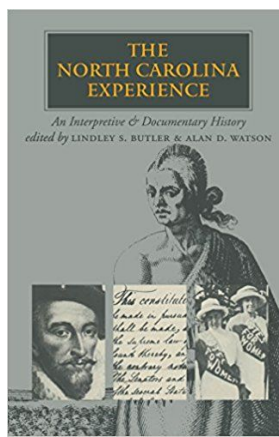
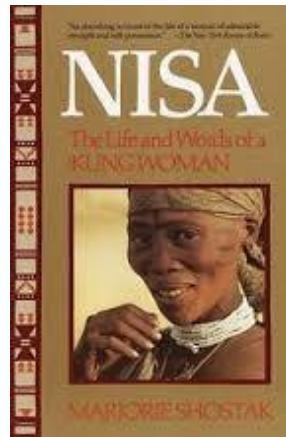
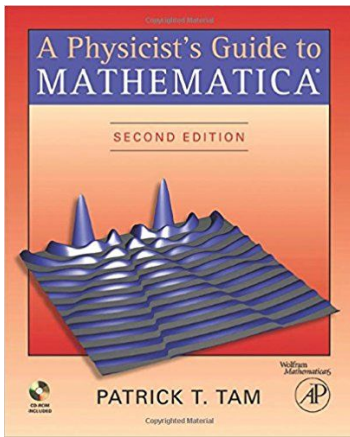
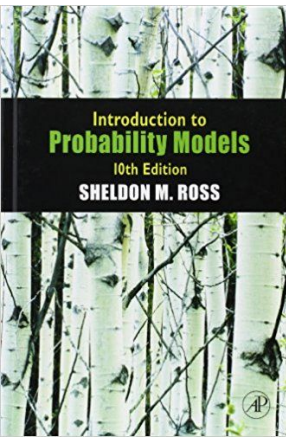


Course Adopted eTextbooks

- Required course lists from bookstore
- Purchase ebooks
- List already-owned ebooks
- Ask profs to notify students
- Make list available online

Returns on Investment for ECU + UNCG

Fall 16, Spring 17, Fall 17, and Spring 18

30,000 students
1,500 class sections
1,000 professors

Alternative Textbook Mini-Grants

- Application process, favoring DE, foundations credit, large classes
- Mini-grants recognize time required to review teaching materials and revise syllabi
- Can use OER, library-provided ebooks, streaming videos, etc.
- Librarian partners



How the mini grants work

- ECU and UNCG held mini grant workshops for faculty in February
- Mini grant promotion and applications completed by end of March
- Committee judged the applications
- Winners announcement in April
- Mini grants given out to the winners by the end of June.
- Faculty worked on their courses during the summer
- Subject specialist/liaisons provided support through the summer
- Faculty implement their course for the fall or spring semester
- Send out a survey for students in these classes in early November
- Check in with faculty at the end of the semester



Mini Grants Awards

Spring 2017:

- **ECU:** 16 awards, 5 colleges, 15 depts
- **UNCG:** 22 awards, 4 colleges, 14 depts

Spring 2018:

- **ECU:** 16 awards, 4 colleges, 10 depts
- **UNCG:** 18 awards, 4 colleges, 15 depts



Impacts and Comments:

- More than **\$500,000** in required textbook costs represented by faculty applicants
- Student grades nearly equivalent (class averages 2.94 “before” compared to 2.98 “after”)
- Satisfied with the program? 71%
- However, significant minority prefer print (30%)

The resources I found are better than the textbook!

Proposal on behalf of UNC University Librarians Advisory Council (ULAC)

- Proposal for funding in the *Deploying Academic Innovations for Affordability* category of UNC General Administration's "Actualizing Innovations Meant to Scale" (AIMS) program
- Submitted by Jan Lewis (ECU), Will Cross (NCSU), Kathy Crowe (UNCG) in December 2016; awarded February 2017

Project goals

- Provide **training** for UNC librarians and faculty to gain a baseline of knowledge about Open Educational Resources
- Provide **resources** for developing OER
- **Promote the use** of OER among UNC campuses
- Begin implementation of OER throughout the system
- We were inspired by examples such as:
 - Student savings of \$31.4M for >260,000 students in Georgia since 2015 at a cost of \$2M in faculty [“textbook transformation grants”](#) to create/adapt open or affordable course materials
 - Student savings of \$1.6M for >7,000 students since 2011 at UMass-Amherst at a cost of \$100,000 in [faculty incentives](#)

Project Update – Workshops and Training

- **Enhancing Student Success: Developing Alternative Textbooks & Resources Workshop** - May 19 @ NCSU's Hunt Library for faculty, librarians, student success specialists, instructional designers
- **[Open Textbook Network](#) Membership & One-Day OTN Training Session** - May 24 @ Hunt Library for 2 representatives from each school
- **Open Textbook Network Summer Institute** – 4 librarians sent to the Institute plus 2 others attended the Summit
- Four **regional workshops** completed

Project Update – Resources and Communication

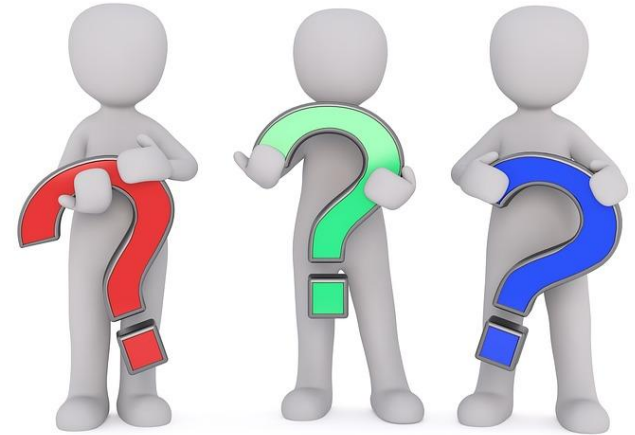
- 9 Faculty OTN workshops on 7 campuses, with 102 faculty attending.
- Faculty who review an Open Textbook Library textbook receive \$200 stipend; historically, about 1/3 of reviewers adopt/adapt an open textbook
- Videos, slide decks & other resources developed and shared:
 - Open Educational Resources LibGuide: <http://libguides.ecu.edu/ulac/OER>
 - Open Science Framework: <https://osf.io/b942e>
- AFFORD-TEXTS-L listserv created & in use

Possible Next Steps:

- Funds from UNC for faculty release time to create new open textbooks/resources or adapt existing open textbooks
- Partner with NC LIVE and maybe UNC Press.
- UNC endorsement of textbook affordability initiatives / faculty recognition
- Faculty disciplinary communities of practice to develop & share materials
- Assessment to evaluate attainment of student learning outcomes
